

ASK THE DOCTOR

What should I know about hormone replacement therapy? I have heard different things about it from women who have been through menopause.

There are a number of treatment options available for women experiencing menopause symptoms, and hormone replacement therapy is one of them. Based on your medical history and the severity of symptoms, your doctor can work with you on a personalized treatment plan.

For example, hormone replacement therapy is not advised for women with certain medical histories such as those with breast cancer, heart disease or blood clots. However, it can benefit women with moderate to severe hot flashes or other menopausal symptoms, those

with normal mammograms, no family history of breast cancer and those that experience a loss in bone mass.

For many women, hormone replacement therapy is a short-term treatment. Menopause symptoms typically subside over time, and eventually, medication is no longer needed. At that time, a doctor can help decrease doses and help eliminate treatments as necessary.

It's important to note that most doctors do not recommend long-term hormone replacement therapy use. A study by the Women's Health Initiative showed that women who using treatment for more than five years slightly increased their stroke and breast cancer risk.

Overall, hormone replacement therapy can ease vaginal symptoms of menopause such as dryness, itching, burning and discomfort with intercourse. And, some studies show health benefits from short-term use such as protection against osteoporosis, colorectal cancer and heart disease.

If you're interested in easing menopausal symptoms, talk to your doctor. While hormone replacement therapy might be a good option, there are a number of natural remedies available over the counter that can help as well. These include Remiphemin, Estroven or Evening Primrose Oil which can be taken orally. You may also benefit from incorporating foods rich in soy — such as soy milk, tofu, beans, endamame — into your diet, avoiding caffeine and increasing exercise. These lifestyle changes have been shown to ease hot flashes, mood swings and sleep trouble.

JENNIFER DICKMAN An Interview with an Animal Communicator

ennifer Dickman has a gift, a gift that she has had all of her life. She can communicate with animals of all sizes and shapes, from goldfish to horses and beyond! One might call her a pet psychic. Jennifer is also an Intuitive Counselor and Reiki Master Teacher who specializes in Animal Reiki. She employs her Reiki skills during animal sessions to both enhance the level of communication and increase the benefit of sessions for the animals.

I'm sure everyone who owns a pet wanted at some time or another to know what their pet was thinking or if they were hurting or in any pain. You may wonder why your cat or dog is acting so peculiar or you may not understand certain behaviors that they are displaying. Wouldn't you like to know if your pet has anything to say to you, something that could perhaps make a situation better for the both of you? Through an Animal Communication session with Jennifer, you can find out just that and more. Jennifer's clients make up a list of their concerns in advance, usually by phone, email or regular mail. A picture of your pet is also recommended. Jennifer has the ability to tune into their vibrations and will spend

a certain amount of time communicating with your pet. She uses Reiki as a vehicle to connect with the animal and she keeps sending it while communicating. She can also do a full Reiki session with your pet where Reiki is the main focus of the session. In order to understand how Jennifer communicates with the animals, you might need to know what Animal Reiki Communication is and how it works. (Jennifer's Reiki skills are not only limited to the animals but for people as well). During an in person session, the energy is transmitted through the hands. It doesn't matter whether you are in the other room or across the ocean, the calming healing Reiki energy transmitted during a session reassures animals that it is safe to express themselves and that any suggestions





or requests made are for their benefit. Reiki can profoundly assist in the body's natural healing process as well as support emotional and spiritual healing. This form of communication provides invaluable insights into your pet's thoughts, needs and desires. Reiki can be sent to past events and trauma's, and to future events such as job interviews.

Jennifer can help you find out what your pet is thinking. She can help you get to the bottom of a behavioral or health issue. She can mediate to help furry friends to get along better and she can reconnect with an animal that has already crossed over. I have acquired Jennifer's services firsthand on a few occasions. I have found her to be quite accurate in relaying things to me that only I would know about my pet's behaviors and attitudes. She has helped me to understand the reasons behind my pets' behaviors and to put my mind at ease with certain situations that have come up concerning them. I do prefer getting the results via email so it's written down and so I don't forget anything that was said during the phone call.

Jennifer also does Intuitive Counseling for people. She started the counseling after receiving an increasing number of intuitive

messages from Spirit for the clients of the animals she was reading. Animal Communication Reiki appointments are available worldwide by phone and email. The rate for a full hour phone session is \$80. Half sessions are available for quick check-ins (no more than 3 questions) for \$45.

Email sessions are \$70 for a full session and \$35 for a half session. (For this low price you can find out what your pet is thinking or anything else about your pet that you want to ask).

Reiki on its own through distance sessions are \$50 for approx. 45 minutes.

Intuitive counseling sessions are \$45 per half hour, and unlike the way my animal communication sessions work, I am on the phone with the client the whole time.

Jennifer was grateful enough to let me interview her. I found her work to be quite fascinating. I hope you do to. If you love your pet and have always been curious about what they are thinking or how they are feeling, here's your chance to find out!

HERE IS MY INTERVIEW WITH JENNIFER:

How old were you when you realized you had a gift?

I started having weird experiences with animals long before I realized that I had an ability to communicate with them. When I was a few years old I had a goldfish. One night I woke up in the middle of the night and saw the goldfish swimming around my bedpost. When my mom came into my room in the morning I told her and she took me down to see the goldfish to prove that it was still in its bowl - it was floating in there dead - it must have visited me during the night to say goodbye. There was another incident around the same time when I was upstairs in my bedroom and my dad brought home a parakeet as a gift for me (I had asked for a parrot!). When he was trying to transfer the parakeet into its cage it escaped, flew up the stairs, straight to my bedroom, and straight at me. When I was around 4, my parents

LANCASTER REVISITED

Lititz and Ephrata Two Towns Rich in Pennsylvania History

ust nine miles north of Lancaster, you'll find Lititz, Pennsylvania, a picture perfect small town with treelined streets. It has a main street and there you can find unique shops and cafes. It is also home to the Wilbur Chocolate Factory. Enter the chocolate store and you can view homemade candies being made through the glass windows. Attached to the building is the main part of the factory. You can hear the whirring of the machinery overhead as it puts out its daily supplies of chocolates to be sent all over the world. The store has a chocolate Candy Americana Antiques collectibles showroom with hundreds of old fashioned coco tins, antique candy moulds, holiday novelties, original art work and advertising. It's a great place to stop in to; you never leave empty handed. The chocolate is really good; take it from a taste tester, and worth the 9-mile trip from Lancaster. You can call (1-888-2wilbur) to request a free Wilbur gifts mail order catalog or visit their site at www.wilburbuds.com for more information. The candy makes a great Christmas or Holiday gift. Another place to stop at is the Julius Sturgis Pretzel Factory on Main Street where hard pretzels are made. The Sturgis Pretzel factory has been around since 1861, and is still in the Sturgis family to this day. The original proprietor, Tom Sturgis, worked for a company that made soft pretzels. One




Large limestone spring - Lititz PA.

day the bakers left the pretzels in the oven overnight by accident and when they tasted them in the morning they liked how the hardened pretzel tasted. Tom Sturgis tried to pitch the idea to his boss to make hard pretzels along with the soft ones but he couldn't sell him on the idea. Tom Sturgis went off and

started up his own pretzel factory making hard pretzels after that. Visitors get to tour the building in Lititz and actually get to make a pretzel. The larger Sturgis Factory is located in Reading, PA and distributes worldwide. They have a variety of gourmet pretzels that you can order online. For more info go to: www.JuliusSturgis.com

Lititz holds the best 4th of July fireworks around the area in the Lititz Springs Park, which is right in the middle of town. If you plan on spending the 4th in Lititz just know that most of the shops are closed for the holiday so you would have to visit the pretzel factory, chocolate factory and other stores either the day before or after. A ten-dollar admission to the park includes entertainment, bands, a Baby Parade, games, food court, Queen of Candles Pageant, and a display of over 7,000 candles that are illuminated over the stream

that runs through the park as soon as the nighttime comes. Best of all, there is a 45-minute hi-tech fireworks display with synchronized sound right after the lighting of the candles. It's fun to see the Amish and the Mennonites joining in the celebration to watch the spectacular fireworks show. You could also spend the day visiting the four covered bridges that are located in Lititz. Three are linked by a bicycle route on a well used bike trail through town. Here is a list of the covered bridges: Hunseckers Mill Covered Bridge, Keller's Mill

Bridge, Erb's Mill Covered Bridge, and Wengers Mill Bridge. The Internet has more information and directions to them all

Lititz was controlled for over a hundred years by the Moravians. It was established in 1749 by the Moravians who were originally from what is now the Czech Republic. Like many other Protestant groups, they came to Pennsylvania seeking freedom of worship. One of the most popular symbols of Lititz today is the Moravian star. In the early 1800 and 1900's, Lititz was known for its spring, which is the largest limestone spring in Pennsylvania. People came from all over for medicinal purposes.

Today Lititz Spring Park encircles the spring. 1818 was the first Independence Day celebration at the park. This annual celebration is now the oldest continuous Fourth of July celebration in the nation.

Lititz was voted the coolest small town in America in 2013. There are many special events planned throughout the year. From Lancaster take route 272 north to route 501 N. To find out more about this wonderful town go to: www.lititz.

Roughly ten miles from Lititz, (turn right off of East Main Street, follow Rothsville Road straight into Ephrata), you will find the town of Ephrata. Be sure to visit the Ephrata Cloisters, which was founded in 1732 as a German community where nearly 80 celibate men and women lived by the strictest disciplines in anticipation of a better world. They lived on little food and worshipped at all times of the day. They worked from early morning, right after their prayers, until dark. They ate only one meal a day, which was later in the evening, and even had to attend midnight service every night, hop on back to bed and then wake again at 4:00 am for two more hours of prayer before going about their work. It was here where they created art and music and published thousands of choir hymns that they sang together during worship. They also had a printing press up and running. The congregation was started by Conrad Beissel who left Germany at the age of 24 to seek religious freedom. In 1732 he sought solitude in the forest of Pennsylvania after spending 12 years as a leader in a local brethren congregation. By 1750 there were 80 followers of Beissel. People living nearby and even married couples joined in the worship at the cloisters. Though they were not willing to become celibate or adhere to Conrad's strict rules, they supported and contributed funds, products, and assistance to the Brothers and Sisters of the Solidarity. The community became known for its charity,

The Suggestion of The Month - If you need to recruit a personal at-home health aide, follow the steps below:

- Place an ad in your local newspaper or church/temple bulletin board.
- Place an ad on Craig's list it's easy and free of charge!
- When interviewing potential at-home health aides, ask to see all credentials or certifications and make copies of them to keep on file.
- Also, make a copy of their identification documents such as driver's licenses for verification, home address and ID purposes. Before they drive your parents to doctor's appoint-

ments, check if the driver's license is valid or not.

- Most importantly, make note of their employment history. During the initial in-person interview, ask about the families for which they worked in the past. Write down specific names and telephone numbers for each family so that you could later call to confirm their employment and to ask for recommendations. In addition, if you notice a time gap in their employment, ask them to provide reasoning for the absence of work.
- After you officially hire your at-home health aide, regularly make unannounced visits to check their quality of service. It would be best to install 24 hour surveillance cameras so that you could check up on your loved ones from your cell phone or computer.
- It is always wise to have a back- up home health aide in place that you can call if there is an emergency as far as staffing. This back-up aide should even train alongside your permanent aide so in the event of an emergency, they could fill in and know exactly what to do. This may be costly, but it will be well worth if this is needed. If there is an emergency, it is best to have a back-up aide who has previously met your loved ones and has received the training and experience needed for this job.

Preplanned Funerals

hen a loved one passes on, it is a stressful and somber time, not a time to make costly decisions. One thing that will prove beneficial to all family members are when pre-planned, prepaid funeral arrangements have been made. This allows important decisions to be made with a clear head, not one dealing with exhaustion and grief. This will reduce the chance of a family being scammed. Funeral scams are very prevalent. I recently had a dear friend billed thousands of dollars to have her spouse embalmed even though he was cremated. In her distraught condition, she paid the bill.

The most important benefit is that prepaying ones funeral is considered a legitimate spend down to reduce assets to qualify for Medicaid nursing home assistance. This will convert money spent on a prepaid funeral from an asset that could exclude you from Medicaid eligibility to an exempt asset, unlike "funeral insurance" which is a countable asset. In New Jersey, a prepaid funeral plan must be irrevocable and the NJ Prepaid Funeral Trust Fund,

established in 1981, provides for this. It requires funeral homes to place your funds in this Trust where your money is FDIC insured.

It makes sense to prepay funeral expenses, which average around \$10,000.00, with the assets of the person who may be institutionalized. It is smart to pay for it now, rather than having a family member pay for it with their money. This allows you to keep that money in the family instead of that money being used to pay for a month or two of nursing home care for an institutional spouse. The funeral expense will be deductible up to a reasonable amount but the cost of food, flowers and travel arrangements for visiting relatives, is not included in the conversion to exempt assets. Take advantage of this planning technique, which both enables you to discuss and plan final arrangements with the person that really counts and as an added bonus, lets you keep money in the family.



Putting in Your Two Cents - Get Out and Vote

y entire life, my jokester father always use to say, "If I want your opinion, I'll ask for it." I tried to find out the origins of the quote and couldn't find it (unknown), so thanks Dad.

Invasion of the Lawn Snatcher (Chinese Packing Grass)

ave you noticed over the past few years the aggressive weed that has been taking over our lawns, woodlands and roadsides? It's everywhere you look. You plant a garden and a week later, almost by magic it's covered with this high grass like species that seems to invade more and more area of your property each year. Yes, it has a name. The Japanese stilt grass is a relatively weak stemmed annual that can grow from one to three feet high. Its hairless stems have a sprawling growth habit that are usually branched and often root at the lower nodes. Each stem has many alternately arranged lance shaped leaves, which are pale green and up to three inches in length. Spikes with numerous quarter inch long flattened trapezoid shaped flowers emerge from the top of the plant in late summer. In the fall, the plants develop a purplish tinge.

These plants are native to eastern and central Asia and the origins here in the U.S. seem to have started in the early 1900's in Tennessee when the plants were used as packing material for fragile Asian porcelain. A hundred years ago, shipment was packed in wooden crates with gaps in between the slates. As it was loaded onto rail cars and sent to different locations, it dropped seeds along the way. People also discarded the packing grass into the environment after opening their



packages. This invasive grass grows in both shade and sunny areas. It gets its name because the mature plant stems resemble stilts. It also looks a little like bamboo, which is perfectly understandable since bamboo is also a gigantic grass. By late October the weed is finished producing seeds and dies shortly afterward, but the seed can stay on the ground for up to three years and reseed.

It is currently established in many states east of the Mississippi and along the gulf coast. It has also been reported in Indiana. Statistics show that it is slowly spreading northeast

to northern New England. Mowing down these weeds before seeds have set can prevent spreading. Mowing during seed production will only result in spreading the weed even more. Remember that even though this species is listed as an annual, seeds on the ground can reseed for up to a three-year span, which will result in never ending seeding. Seeds can also be windblown.

The best way to rid your property of this invasive weed is to use some kind of pesticide on it. This must be applied before the weed fruits. Seeds can often survive the chemicals so continual spraying is advised. When choosing a pesticide, please choose something other than Round up, which is owned by the GMO food-producing corporation, Monsanto. We don't need to support them in anyway. For lawns, crabgrass control products seem to help stop the seeds from spreading. This invasive weed can grow from one to three feet and can smother plants and gardens, invade lawns and take over the forest floor. The weed is easy to pull and should be pulled in early summer before the seeds appear. Too bad the deer do not like this plant. That would certainly be a solution to the invasion problem. Now that you know what you are dealing with, you can take the steps necessary to keep it from further taking over your property. Good Luck!



s part of our 'Welcome Package,' I want to introduce our readers to the facts and figures of our newest readers from Plumsted Township and New Egypt. I am sure most of their residents don't know much of this information either and may find it interesting.

Plumsted Township, located in Ocean County, was incorporated as a township on March 22, 1845. Cornelius Hendrickson, a Dutch surveyor, navigator and cartographer, was the first European explorer to arrive in this area. A battle of the French and Indian War took place in this region in 1754.

Initially the land was part of Jackson Township while it was part of Monmouth County. Additional property from

neighboring Upper Freehold was added in 1849. Plumsted became part of the newly created Ocean County in 1850. This was similar to parts of Middlesex County taken to form Millstone Township in Monmouth County on February 28, 1844. Much of the shuffling around of boundaries and townships had to do with the location of creeks and streams.

According to the Ocean County Library website, "The Township of Plumsted was incorporated in 1845 and covers New Egypt and Cream Ridge. The historic district in town consists of 114 structures. Most of the

structures are found in the downtown area of New Egypt and along Evergreen road. They are representative of several architectural styles found in the late 18th and 19th centuries. They trace the development of New Egypt from the original mill town to its emergence as a popular market place. All of this adds to the charm and character found today in the village of New Egypt. People came from Philadelphia and New York to spend their summer by Oakford Lake in New Egypt.

By 1908, New Egypt had become a summer resort. Cranberry bogs grew with abundance. In 1868 the railroad came to New Egypt. Passengers as well as freight kept the railroad busy. However in 1959, as trucks became a more popular mode of transportation, the railroad in New Egypt ceased to exist. "

The population back in 1859 was 1,613 according to census records. The latest census in 2010 showed 8,421 comprised of 2,936 households, and 2,311 families residing in the township. The population density was 212.1 inhabitants per square mile (81.9 /km2). There were 3,067 housing units at an average density of 77.2 per square mile (29.8 /km2). The racial makeup of the township was 94.19% (7,932) White, 1.81% (152) Black or African American, 0.32% (27) Native American, 0.87% (73) Asian, 0.02% (2) Pacific Islander, 1.24% (104) from other races, and 1.56% (131) from two or more races. Hispanic or Latino of any race was 5.91% (498) of the population.

Of the 2,936 households, 37.4% had children under the age of 18 living with them, 64.3% were married couples living together, 9.5% had a female head of the house with no husband present, and 21.3% were unrelated occupants. 16.8% of all households were made up of individuals and 7.3% had someone living alone who was 65 years of age or older. The average household size was 2.87 and the average family size was 3.29

In Plumsted Township, 26.2% of the population were

under the age of 18, 7.3% from 18 to 24, 24.2% from 25 to 44, 30.9% from 45 to 64, and 11.4% who were 65 years of age or older. The median age was 40.9 years. The population was split evenly between men and women.

The median household income was \$73,790 (with a margin of error of \pm -\$8,323) and the median family income was \$89,279 (\pm -\$12,381). Males had a median income of \$54,614 (\pm -\$8,958) versus \$46,886 (\pm -\$3,261) for females. The per capita income for the borough was \$31,719 (\pm -\$2,499). About 4.4% of families and 7.3% of the population were below the poverty line, including 11.0% of those under age 18 and 9.6% of those ages 65 or over.

Plumsted Township is governed under the Township

form of government with a five-member Township Committee. These elected officials are currently Committeeman Mike Wysong, Committeeman Jack Trotta, Deputy Mayor Eric Sorchik, Mayor Dave Leutwyler, and Committeeman Herb Marinari.

Plumstead Township as well as New Egypt are located in the 4th Congressional District and are part of New Jersey's 12th state legislative district. Their current State elected officials are Senator Samuel Thompson, State Assemblymen Robert D. Clifton and Ronald S. Dancer. Your representation as part of the Fourth Congressional District

is Congressmen Christopher Smith and your U.S. Senators are Bob Menendez and Jeffrey Chiesa who was elected by special election following the death of Frank Lautenberg.

New Egypt is an unincorporated area located within Plumsted Township. Local legend is that while in the area, General George Washington sent soldiers in search of food and supplies. When one returned with food, he joked "Here is Joseph, returned from Egypt with wheat." Supposedly, the name stuck.

As of the 2010 United States Census, the CDP's population was 2,512. As of the 2010 United States Census, there were 2,512 people comprising 902 households, and 652.1 families residing in the town. The population density was 625.7 inhabitants per square mile (241.6 /km²). There were 972 housing units at an average density of 242.1 per square mile (93.5 /km²). The racial makeup of the CDP was 91.44% (2,297) White, 1.99% (50) Black or African American, 0.84% (21) Native American, 0.96% (24) Asian, 0.08% (2) Pacific Islander, 3.11% (78) from other races, and 1.59% (40) from two or more races. Hispanic or Latino of any race were 10.51% (264) of the population[

Of the 902 households, 34.8% had children under the age of 18 living with them, 52.9% were married couples living together, 13.2% had a female head of house with no husband present, and 27.7% were unrelated occupants. 21.3% of all households were made up of individuals and 7.1% had someone living alone who was 65 years of age or older. The average household size was 2.78 and the average family size was 3.21.

In the town, 25.3% of the population were under the age of 18, 9.1% from 18 to 24, 26.7% from 25 to 44, 29.8% from 45 to 64, and 9.2% who were 65 years of age or older. The median age was 37.2 years. The men outnumber the women slightly by 103.4 to 100.

New Egypt is considered a Census Designated Place

which means the population is separated out for the purposes of the census but they do not have a separate municipal government. They share their elected officials with Plumsted Township.

According to the Ocean County Library website, "The community of New Egypt began in the early 1700's as two mills: Snuff Mill and Kimmons Mills (Timmons). Snuff Mill, the older community, had a grist mill, slaughter house, hotel, post office, general store, and a number of small farms and homes. Kimmons Mills was found on the western bank of the Crosswicks Creek. Cowperthwaite Kimmons used good business sense during years of bumper crops by storing extra grain. Then, during lean times people from near and far would travel to his granary for corn. This is reminiscent of Biblical times when people traveled to Egypt for corn, so that finally the town became known as "New Egypt." Today New Egypt is still a place that people come to for food. U-Pick Farms surround area. "

MainStreetUSA.com states "Clement Plumsted, of London, was granted 2,700 acres in 1699, which included most of the land now, called New Egypt. On the John Hill Map of Monmouth County, 1781, this tract of land was referred to as "Plumstead's" and is the earliest known name found for New Egypt. In 1845, New Egypt, and the 40 square mile area surrounding it, was incorporated as Plumsted Township in honor of Clement Plumsted. It was once stated that all roads led to New Egypt. Until the early 1900's this statement held true. New Egypt was once two separate settlements known as Newport and Snuff Mill. In the late 1700's the town was called Egypt and there is no official record as to when it began to be called New Egypt. But on December 28, 1869, the name was voted to be changed from New Egypt to Oakford. In March 1870 it was changed back again to New Egypt. "

Roll Away The Tires


n Saturday and Sunday, October 12th and 13th, Plumsted Youth for Nature and the Environment (PYNE) organized a tire clean up event on Ocean County preserved land near Oak Leaf Drive in New Egypt. Fifty five volunteers, including members of the 818 Global Mobility Squadron of the United States Air Force, showed their commitment to the environment and our community by collecting 751 tires, 60 bags of trash and recyclables, and 2 pick-up truck loads of miscellaneous garbage. PYNE partnered with Bridgestone Americas, under its "One Team, One Planet" Spent Tire Program, for the removal of the tires at no charge. Through this program, Bridgestone ensures that the tires will go to a beneficial reuse.

Scrap tires can threaten not only our environment, but the public health of a community as well. Because of their shape, scrap tires can collect debris and water, which create an ideal breeding habitat for insects carrying diseases



such as the West Nile Virus. Many kinds of mosquitoes prefer to breed in the quiet, stagnant water that collects inside tires.

With the support of Ocean County, Plumsted Township, the Plumsted Township Environmental Commission, and Bridgestone Americas and its affiliates, PYNE is organizing a clean up of approximately 750 tires from public land near Plum Ridge Drive and Oak Leaf Drive, known as Coastal Divide I and Coastal Divide III. The Coastal Divide is a 300-acre elevated ridge that sits on the boundary of two watersheds, one draining into the Barnegat Bay, the other into the Delaware River. It is also home to many animal and plant species, including mountain laurel.




The Union Transportation Trail A Walk Through Creamridge and Upper Freehold's History

ant a new place to walk that's relatively level and not too far from home, then try out the Union Transportation Trail which starts in Creamridge, a stones throw away from the New Egypt border. The trails are paved with some gravel on top and accessible by bike, walking and horseback riding. The first two miles of the gravel trail from Millstream Road to Jonathon Holmes Road opened in 2010 and the later, from Jonathon Holmes parking lot to Davis Station Road, was completed in 2011. Jonathon Holmes parking lot to Davis Station Road is also roughly two miles. This section was opened in 2011. The linear section crosses Miry Run Creek. When the trail is fully completed it will measure 8.6 miles in length. There is a map at both parking sites where you can continue to see the progress of the trail as more miles are added on.

There is a newly constructed trestle bridge exactly where the old trestle bridge crossed over the Lahaway Creek in between Milstream Rd. and Jonathon Holmes Rd. The trail is open from 7:00a.m. through 7:30p.m. throughout the year to the beginning of October, and then closes an hour earlier during the winter months.

There are two parking lots and access points for parking. One is at Millstream Road. This is a good place to start. It's an easy drive to the parking lot. Take route 537 towards New Egypt (west), cross over route539 and look for Millstream Rd (approx. 1 mile on the right.) You will see





signs for the Union Transportation Trail on the right hand side of Route 537. After you turn onto Millstream Rd., the parking lot is on the left. This trail will lead you across the road and into the woods. You will cross a road or two on your adventure, so be very careful, especially if you are with children. About three miles up the trail you will come to the other parking lot. The Jonathon Holmes parking lot is located west on 537, then turn right at the traffic light onto Emleys Hill Road, then bear left onto Jonathon Holmes Rd. You will see the lot on the right hand side. Going left on the trail will take you back to the Millstream parking lot. From one parking lot to the other is roughly two miles. There and back would give you a good four-mile walk or ride. If you wish to continue going further down the trail, (going right at the Jonathon Holmes parking lot), you will end up on Davis Station Road in Creamridge but there is no parking accessible there unless you get permission to park at the Cream Ridge golf course nearby, if you want to make that your starting or ending point.

The ride is relatively flat with some slight inclines, hardly an obstacle to the novice bike rider. Someone who hasn't ridden a bike in ten years, like myself, will notice every upgrade, though slight as it may be. The scenic trail will take you between many horse farms, meandering streams, and between tall trees, which are just starting to change color. (What a great way to observe the fall foliage). Dogs are allowed and there are plastic bags available to clean up after them. There have been a few complaints about horse droppings left on the trail. Horse Riders, perhaps you can bring a plastic scoop with you and remove the droppings off to the side. We all need to be courteous of one another.

The Union Transportation trail was once the Pemberton & Hightstown Railroad, a short line right of way established in 1864 providing farms, dairies, and workers access to larger

railroad junctions in Pemberton and Hightstown to sell their products. In 1868, the trains traveled through Hornerstown, New Egypt, Cream Ridge, Davis, Imlaystown, and Sharon in Upper Freehold Township. It took both passengers and products. The passenger line ended in 1931 but the freight continued on some sections of the line until 1977. Jersey Central Power and light now owns the right of way. The Park System obtained a permanent easement from them for use of making a trail.

The Clayton Park Trail is another good trail off of Emley's Hill Road in Upper Freehold. The trail is a natural trail that wanders through a forest of wonderful trees of all different native species. To any plant lover, it is one of the best spring wildflower sites in the Park System where you can view wildflowers such as jack in the pulpit, trout lily, spring beauty, wild geraniums, wild ginger, and the bright hepatica flower. It's a favorite spot to terrain bicyclists and offers roughly 6 miles of rugged trails. There are easier walking trail too that take you out by picnic tables and a small lake. The trails are marked from easy to moderate.

This land was acquired from farmer Paul Clayton and his daughter. Farmer Paul worked the fields with his five horses growing potatoes, tomatoes, grain and corn until 1971. He retired at the age of 87 and rather than sell the land off to people who were interested in harvesting the many varieties of trees on the property, he sold his farm to the park system. The park offers a rustic appeal, an informational kiosk at the trailhead, marked trails, portable toilets, and a gravel parking lot. (Turn left onto Emleys Hill road and follow signs to the park). There is plenty of parking available.

Now is the time when the weather is cooler to grab a friend and go enjoy a nice walk. The scenery is free!

Achieving Balance for Life and for

Riding; Yoga for Horseback Riders

Yoga is a generic term for physical, mental, and spiritual disciplines, which originated in ancient India. For thousands of years, this has been practiced with a goal of attaining a state of permanent peace. Through the years, many have come to realize that the physical postures of yoga can be used to ease health problems, reduce stress and make the spine more flexible. Yoga is also used as a comprehensive exercise program and for physical therapy routines.

More recently, yoga has been used by athletes in various sports. This more specialized yoga works on muscle groups that are specific and essential to that sport. In our horse-loving area of Monmouth County, yoga has been used for horseback riders.

Allyson Jeffery is an equine bodywork and massage therapist, which essentially means she uses massage and other modalities to reduce stress, promotes relaxation, and prevent injury and disease before it occurs. It is cost effective and non-invasive. She herself has practiced yoga for 15 years. She is very active in the equine community and a Trustee of The Horse Park of New Jersey.

Combining Allyson's expertise of horses, her experience with yoga and the experience of Wendy Verdia, a certified yoga instructor from the Freehold Yoga Center, they are now offering specialized yoga instruction for horseback riders. The basic idea is that with yoga's slow stretching, it increases your flexibility as well as body awareness. Each movement made by the rider effects what the horse does. This type of yoga works on muscle groups essential to riding. Your body language alters signals to the horse. Yoga will make you more balanced and relaxed on your horse, allowing the horse clear understanding of your intent. This is being used internationally and has been embraced by Olympic level riders.

Classes are held at the Green Bough Farm in Millstone, which is owned and operated by Mrs. Beverly Kenney and her husband Dr. Jim Kenney, a local veterinarian. Currently there are 13 people signed up for the class. The next 6-week session will begin November 21.

ere is a challenge. Let's say you are given 69 acres of preserved farmland in Manalapan and had to come up with a plan of what to do with it. Being that it is preserved, you have tight limitations; it has to be farm or farm related. The property was owned by a family for many years and was left fairly untouched for much of it. Overgrown with vegetation and dilapidated buildings, it is a hefty chore.

Into the game walks Tim Stockel. As a lifetime Manalapan resident, Tim welcomed the challenge. As the owner of a landscaping business, he possessed unique skills and the right equipment to do just about anything, not to mention a great imagination and fun loving spirit.

Tim and his wife, Olivia, opened Happy Day Farm in 2011 at 97 Daum Road in Manalapan, after a long journey of planning and implementing a massive endeavor. The property has been transformed into a fun place for families and a haven for outdoorsy kids. What kid of any age wouldn't love a day running through a 10-Acre Corn Maze, the largest in New Jersey? Most kids get to play in a sand box; at Happy Days you roll around in a Corn Box. Then of course there is the Hayride, Pig Races, the Petting Zoo, and the Hay Maze. You can also enjoy the Corn Stalk Tunnel, Horse Shaped Swings, Pie Eating Contest, and Pedal Carts for all ages and Rubber Duck Racing. took me to the petting zoo at the Philadelphia Zoo and the entire herd of sheep mobbed me, like a circle around me. My dad had to rush in and pull me out. Obviously, at that point I had no idea what was going on, that I was an animal communicator, etc., but that's when I started having strange experiences with animals. I was also apparently going around at that time telling people I wanted to be a veterinarian and help animals – people were supposedly shocked that I both knew what a veterinarian was and that I could pronounce it. It wasn't until I was in my late teens that I began to rediscover that I was able to in some way connect with animals and sense their energy. I didn't truly realize I was an animal communicator until I did my Reiki training and my teacher's cat gave me a message and the teacher confirmed it and told me I had a gift and should develop it. That's what started me on my current path.

Did it frighten you at all in the beginning being able to communicate with the animals?

The experiences I had with animals as a young child were frightening, but I of course didn't realize then what was going on.

Does this ability run in your family?

No, but psychic ability does run in my family on my mother's side, though I haven't heard of anyone else having been able to communicate with animals. My grandmother, who was very psychic but never developed it, had a persistent problem with a squirrel running into her house when my mom was young. I've never heard of that happening before, so maybe she was having experiences like I had as a young child.

Do you hear a language when the animals speak to you?

Animals communicate in images and feelings. My brain is somehow able to translate this into words.

Do they learn to understand English?

Animals understand a few words they hear us say often, but they more understand the images and feelings behind what we say to them.

Is it more a telepathy - images, emotions? Yes.

Does it astonish the pet when they realize you can communicate with them?

Sometimes. It is usually more a feeling of relief, like they've been waiting to be heard and now finally they have their chance. When I'm doing a planned session, the animal usually already knows from their person that it will take place and is expecting the contact.

Do they wonder why people can't understand what they are trying to tell them?

They are sometimes very frustrated, especially when they think they are clearly giving the message over and over again. But, they do usually understand that people can't communicate the way they do. This is where problem behaviors sometimes arise – when we miss the subtle communications and the animal has to try harder and harder to express itself, until it becomes frustrated and chooses a behavior it knows will get our attention.

Do you communicate to deceased animals? Yes.

Do all deceased animals cross over right away?

Sometimes they wait a little. For example, a dog I worked with recently, who died suddenly, first went to his mom, who was racing home in her car, and stayed with her until she was home and with her husband, and then he crossed over. They visit us a lot, particularly right after they cross, especially animals that are more protective of us.

Do they go to a special place or a place with people too?

I think we're not really allowed to know all that goes on when animals or people cross over. I know that animals that have crossed are often with people when I talk to them. I don't know if when they first cross over they go to a place that's different than when people first cross over.

Can you turn your gift off- example- when you walk into a Petsmart- can you hear what they are saying or do you have to approach them first and come into their vibration?

Yes, thankfully I can turn it off, although sometimes animals slip through. Sometimes an animal I've worked with will contact me out of the blue. Recently, I had an absolutely horrifying experience with a deceased fish in the grocery store describing its death to me. I felt it suffocating – it was horrible. I think it wanted me to know how fish suffer when they are taken out of water.

Are animals more intelligent than they are given credit for?

Absolutely! I've met birds and horses who are smarter than many people, and it's horrifying the way many of them are treated. But, in general, we do not give animals credit for the full intelligence and range of emotions they possess. Animals possess greater emotional intelligence than many people, and sometimes greater intellectual intelligence.

What was the most unique animal you have communicated with?

In terms of species, I recently did a session with a hamster, and have worked with gerbils, an iguana, snakes, and turtles. In terms of just a unique being, early in my career I worked with a very special cat that had many congenital birth defects and wasn't supposed to live much longer, according to the vets. My client rescued him so that he wouldn't live out his days in a shelter cage and did everything she could for him. I spent hours communicating with him and doing Reiki, and due to my client's loving care and his own happiness in her home and inner strength, he outlived the predictions of the vets by many months. He was an inspiration to everyone who met him, and solidified for me that I was doing what I was meant to be doing.

Do many people ask about their pet's health?

Many people approach me with animals with health issues. While I'm happy to give guidance in this area from the animals' perspective, I always make it clear that I'm not a vet and a session with me is not a substitute for veterinary care. There have been times when I've turned down doing sessions until the animal sees a vet — I don't want an animal to suffer because doing a session with me has delayed seeing a vet, or I've missed something, etc. But, sometimes when vets are stumped I'm able to help figure out what the problem is.

Can you help with lost pets?

I'm able to see images from the animals, but can't give their people a location, and aside from it taking an emotional toll on me, I don't want to take money from people and not deliver results.

Can you tell me a little about your Intuitive counseling?

My intuitive counseling is basically life coaching combined with intuitive impressions. I started doing it because I'd be doing sessions with animals and start getting messages for their people that seemed like they weren't coming from the animals. My clients confirmed the info I was getting was accurate, and started asking me to do sessions for them. I have a BA in comparative religion and have been studying spirituality since I was a teenager, and also did volunteer work with abused kids, so the intuitive counseling sort of combines all of my abilities. I always tell people that it's not a psychic reading and not a replacement for therapy. I make it clear that I'm not a mental health practitioner and not a substitute for one. Some sessions are much more grounded in just common sense talking things out, and some draw more on intuitive impressions. It all depends on what the client needs, and just the direction the session takes. Sometimes the sessions seem to take on a life of their own and leave both the client and myself inspired and uplifted, sometimes they just give the client a different perspective or some needed clarity. While I love working with animals, I really love this aspect of my work, too.

Thank you Jennifer for your interview and for all of your help with my own pets. May you continue to help both the people and the animals with your incredible gift!

helping new settlers in the area to build houses, caring for the poor and elderly, and offering guests lodging. When Conrad Beissel died in 1768 a lack of interest in the celibate life and the strict disciplines led to its decline. Today only a fraction of the Ephrata's Cloisters eighteenth century heritage survives. The Ephrata cloister Museum host special programs throughout the year that highlight the history of this Early American Community. The Ephrata Cloister chorus presents selections from early Ephrata throughout the year, lantern tours on selected evenings, spring concerts, a Founders Day Celebration, an Apple Dumpling Sale, Christmas at the Cloisters, and tours of the settlement are offered throughout the year. There are two old gravesites on the premises and a gift shop. One of the gravesites is called the Mount Zion Cemetery, which holds the graves of several early Ephrata members and also a mass grave of Revolutionary soldiers who did not make it through the winter of 1777-1778. Tour the grounds and see the old buildings that have survived the ages. They include Conrad Beissel's home, the Saron Sisters home, The Saal meetinghouse, A Weavers house, the Academy, The Bakery, the Saron Bake oven, the small bake house, Bethania Brothers house, the printing office, the Cocalico creek and spring, the Carpenters house, the amphitheater, the workshop, the stable, and more. The other gravesite is called Gods Acre, the burial ground of Conrad Beissel, where the earliest marked grave is from 1767.

The Cocalico Creek and Spring dates back to the time of the native Indians where many ancient artifacts and tools were dug up nearby. The spring served as a source of cool water, a source for a water powered saw mill a mile from the Cloister, and a place for baptism for new members. Conrad Beissel chose this spot because of the availability of fresh water nearby.

Today, Ephrata is a thriving small town that takes pride in its heritage. Many old order Mennonites reside in the royal communities surrounding Ephrata. If you like history, visit the Cloisters. Get a feel for how these celibate people lived back in the 1700's. For more information on the Ephrata Cloisters: www.ephratecloister.org.

There is so much to see so close to home. America has so much rich history. Take a weekend, explore, discover and learn about what made this country so great! This is a land where all can live and practice their own faith and not be persecuted or killed for their beliefs. To be able to see old orders that still exist today in our own backyards such as the Amish and Mennonites is history in itself. Here's to your journey!

rom the road, Calgo Gardens looks like a charming little garden business. The colors and textures, displayed in front, spark your imagination and make you wonder what is inside.

I parked my car, walked through the side gate into the nursery. It was so much more than I could have imagined. They have a great selection of perennials, annuals, shrubs and trees displayed in a beautiful setting. Throughout the outdoor area you stroll through amazing gardens and an award winning tiered patio that incorporates a water feature and fire pit. There is a rustic farmhouse, several buildings and a greenhouse. This is not a place that just sells plants. Their talented nursery staff consists of horticulturalists and designers. Tammy Geric is a licensed massage therapist, reiki master teacher, craniosacral practitioner, esthetician and ordained minister (among other things). She has been in the spa





MTFEE was the first organization in the district to put iPadsTM into the classroom in the spring of 2011. There are currently more than 60 MTFEE-funded grant programs running. Every child that matriculates through the school district will in some way benefit from an MTFEE-funded grant. MTFEE is a member of New Jersey Education Foundation Partnership and The National Consortium of State and Local Education Foundations (NCEFS).

This Holiday Season, Don't Take a Holiday from Your Health



arm gingerbread cookies, fresh pumpkin pie with whipped cream, mashed potatoes with gravy...the words alone conjure up feelings of comfort and pleasure. Between the buffet luncheon at the office, family gatherings, religious festivities, and cookie baking fests for friends, the challenge of sticking to a healthy eating plan becomes an annual tradition unto itself! But, don't despair and resign yourself to gaining the 5-10 pounds that is commonly gained between Thanksgiving and the New Year. By making the decision to avoid this and by applying common sense principles that are guided by your head and not your stomach, you can begin 2014 without extra baggage around your waistline.

Three key steps will keep you on track. PAM- Planning ahead, Activity, and Mindful 'indulging'. Plan for social events by eating a light, high protein snack several hours before. A piece of fruit, such as a pear, along with a slice of cheese or, a small bowl of a high fiber cereal with some low fat milk are good choices to hold you over. Avoid skipping meals or starving yourself so that you can indulge at the party. This approach is almost always a set up for over-compensating at the event. Though this time of year leaves us short on time, make exercise and even less formal forms of activity (i.e. raking leaves) a priority. Short 5-10 minute bursts of high intensity exercise, performed twice a day, can help stoke your inner metabolic fire and build important calorie burning muscle at the same time. With the planning and activity under wraps you are now ready for some mindful indulging. This involves the practice of the Five D's: Delay, Distract, Distance, Decide, and Determine. Before indulging in the desired calorie laden food such as the brownies on the table nearby, delay 10 minutes by distracting and distancing yourself from them. Perhaps walk across the room to talk to someone else. If after 10 minutes you have decided that you really want a brownie then determine how much you will eat. Ask yourself how much you have already eaten at the gathering and how full you are feeling at that moment. A rule of thumb is to stop when you feel 80% full, in other words, you feel satisfied but not 'stuffed''. Last, imagine how you will feel the next morning as you go to zip up your jeans or tighten your belt buckle.

Finally, try and stay positive. Everyone, even the most disciplined person, will slip and get off track. But don't let this become a slippery slope. Get back on track and look forward to rewarding yourself for your success by indulging in all of those big after holiday sales. You deserve it!

'm sure some of you who own pets have been faced with the dilemma of having to decide on whether to go ahead with an expensive surgery for your animal or put him down. Surgeries to save a pets life can costs thousands of dollars. It's a fact that hundreds of thousands of pets with treatable conditions are put down every year because of financial constraints that prevent them from being able to afford necessary surgeries or emergency veterinary care. This is where Vet-i- Care comes in.

Vet-I- Care is a 501© (3) non-profit charitable organization committed to helping families obtain the funds so they can afford needed surgeries and specialty care for their pets. Vet—i- Care was started by caring technicians and doctors that have seen firsthand the toll it takes on the pet owners when they have no choice but to put their beloved animal down because

they could not afford the necessary medical care. Vet-i- care 's mission is to be a resource to families and their pets during their time of need, to be able to give the pet owners a way to pay for specialty lifesaving surgeries and more importantly to give the pet a chance at life. The organization is funded by the generosity of the public and surrounding communities and through fund raising events and also through the generosity of places like North Star Veterinary Clinic in Robbinsville, who allow them to hold certain fundraiser events on their premises. Some past events included an Ice Cream Social for the animals at North Star, a family pet portrait with the Easter Bunny, Santa Paws, the Charity Polo Match in Colts Neck, and

the upcoming Luck of the Paw Casino Night on Saturday November 16th from 7-11 (See flyer for details).

You can also purchase a brick paver and add it to the "Hope and Healing Garden" at North Star Veterinary Clinic to help support the life saving work of the Vet-i-Care Foundation. You'll be happy to know that every dollar collected goes directly to the pets in need. Vet-i-Care's sole mission is to reduce the number of pets that are being put down when there is still hope for them to be able to live out the rest of their natural lives.

You can help save dogs like Charlie, a two year old Bulldog, who was hit by a car last December. Charlie's injuries were extensive and he was transferred from the family vet to a specialist where the surgical team found that he had suffered a severe pelvic fracture. He needed surgery to achieve full healing. With the financial aid from vet-i-care, Charlie's family was able to get him the needed surgery that they otherwise couldn't afford. Charlie would have become a statistic, but instead is now home and on the mend with his loving family by his side.

Riley is a five year old Cock-a-poo that the Baker Family had since he was six weeks old. Riley was always vocal and playful and when he suddenly became quiet and withdrawn and began straining to urinate, the family knew something was wrong. His veterinarian did tests on him and found that he had a serious blockage that was obstructing his urination. Riley was sent to the Emergency/ Specialty Hospital where an emergency team determined that he needed a special procedure called a Cystotomy. The Bakers loved Riley very much but due to personal medical issues of

their own and a job loss, they were not able to afford the immediate surgery. They were told about Vet-i-Care and applied and received the financial assistance that would allow Riley to receive the treatment that would save his life. With Vet-i-Care and the surgical specialists in alignment, Riley got his surgery and is healing and doing great at home. Both animals will be able to have many more years together with their families.

Stitch is a nine-year-old male Husky. He was taken to All Fur Paws Animal Hospital in

Millstone Township where his vet diagnosed him with a hemangiosarcoma on his hock that was very painful. He had to have emergency intensive surgery with daily bandage changes and rehab. The family didn't have the extra money to pay for the surgery. If they didn't get the surgery, the cancer would have spread. Instead of euthanizing, the Vet spoke with Vet-i-Care and explained the situation. The family was approved for surgery and Stitch is now happy and healthy.

There are so many more pets out there that can be saved. Don't let money be their obstacle. They need your help. Please, won't you consider a small donation to help save a beloved pet's life?
