I'm stressed out! Should I see a doctor?

We all feel stressed sometimes. Frustrations at work, relationship issues, family problems – these can all lead to stress.

In small amounts, stress is normal, but too much can contribute to physical and emotional health problems. Constant daily stressors can increase our blood pressure, heart rate, blood sugar and make us more susceptible to infections, weight gain, diabetes, and heart disease.

It's therefore important to be aware of your stress and know how to manage it to help prevent health threats.

Everyone responds to stress differently. For some, the signs may be physical such as back or neck pain, headaches or diarrhea. Others may experience emotional symptoms such as difficulty sleeping, a change in eating habits, or a lack of energy. Any combination of these signs and symptoms is reason enough to make an appointment with your doctor, but here are a few tips to help manage stress in your life.

Give yourself a pep talk. It's easy to get sidetracked from your priorities. The moment you start to go off course and feel overwhelmed – stop! Pull yourself in and refocus.

Find your quiet place. Close the blinds in your office, take a walk in the park or schedule a massage. Whatever your stressor, take time to be quiet. Listen to yourself breathe and reclaim your balance. Don't multitask. Multitasking is a myth not a gift. It creates stress and average results. Beloved Teacher Counts Down Her Days

Millstone resident, Joanne Schiumo has mixed emotions about retiring in June. Although she loves working with children, she feels it's time to do other things, like traveling, and gardening, and getting ready for her new grandchildren in mid September. Her daughter in law Melissa is having not just one baby, but triplets, and knowing the kind of woman that JoAnne is, there is no doubt that she will be there to help her son Michael's new family out any way that she can. Teaching has been her life for the past twenty six years. Mrs. Schiumo started out as a substitute teacher in the Clarksburg school, now the Municipal Building, before being hired as a second grade teacher in the newly built elementary school at the time. Some of us were lucky enough to have had the pleasure of our children attending the Clarksburg school and getting to know the teachers on a more personal level before the school could no longer handle the new growth in the

township. There is nothing but fond memories of the teachers who started out at the Clarksburg school and their devotion and dedication to each and every child. That devotion and passion from these very same teachers followed them over into the Elementary School. Especially in Mrs. Schiumo's second grade class where she greeted little faces every morning with a song and a poem and if needed, a hug. Joanne started what was to be called the Friendship club in her classroom. She wanted the atmosphere to be one of family where everyone helps each other. She wanted her kids to know that when they walk in her door, they are in a safe place; that respect for each other is everything. She taught students to care about each other as they worked within teams in the classroom. She also taught them how to be good listeners and how to stay organized. Mrs. Schiumo felt it important to establish these good rules in the beginning and use it as a guide as the school year progressed. She taught her children to look on the bright side of everything and to be open and positive. It's no wonder she was able to switch gears so easily from teaching second grade for twenty one years to kindergarten for the past three years. Her loving nature and her genuine concern about each individual student made it an easy transformation for her.

Joanne clearly cares about the children that have crossed her path. Striving to help each student become successful in her classroom has been her main goal and she doesn't forget about her students once they've moved on either. Katie Citron is a senior at a Biotechnical High School in the area. She had the privilege of having Mrs. Schiumo in second grade. She remembers what a great teacher she was and how she had such a positive influence on her. She even called Katie at home when she was in eighth grade to personally congratulate her for getting the top student award

Second grader Mia Colsom had Mrs. Schiumo for kindergarten. Her mother Marcy couldn't empathize enough the amount of compassion that this woman had for all of her students; the passion in her teaching and the love she had for them all as if they were her own family. Her daughter couldn't have had any one better to start off her academics.

Another former student, Matthew Merritt, who works as a Realtor and Broker for Prudential Real Estate in Millstone, had this to say, "Mrs. Schiumo was my 2nd grade teacher. I can remember her always being very involved with every student as if they were her own child. She is the type of person that would go over and above to help, guide or educate someone. Even to this day when we have seen each other from time to time, she has always been a positive individual who seems to always lift you up no matter what the situation. I consider her teaching and mentoring as one of the core building blocks in my life. Looking back on where I am today, she is definitely one of the few people who I can say made a lasting impression and difference in my life."

Former teacher, since retired. Gail Hillman has nothing but the best to say about her long time friend and co-worker. She knew from the minute Joanne walked into her classroom with her small son Michael that they were destined to be friends. Michael was in her kindergarten class and the two women immediately became friends. Gail considers Joanne her sister friend. They are a big part of each other's families. Having worked side by side together for many years, Gail describes Joanne as a soft spoken person. Aside from her wonderful knack for teaching, she credits Joanne for her gentle, loving, nurturing way toward every child that walked into her classroom. "The children responded to her love," Gail pointed out. "She stayed true to her values of what a good teacher should be. She never had a harsh word for anyone. Her devotion was to her students and her family beliefs. Her heart makes her who she is. Her love for what she does is her center core," Gail went on. "Any child that needed help, Joanne would have lunch with them and give up her spare time to give them the extra attention that they needed. Parents adored her and they knew that their children were very lucky to get such a devoted teacher." Parents still continue to adore her and everyone that I spoke to about her had nothing but good things to say about this woman who touched so many hearts.

Joanne was lucky to have the career that she always dreamed of. When she was in sixth grade, she was a monitor for a kindergarten teacher. She got to help the teacher with her class. She credits her love for teaching on the great experience she received being the teachers helper. A seed was planted in her and as she got older the desire to teach became greater and greater. Joanne had the pleasure of tracking down her former mentor, who is now an award winning poet, and thank her personally. They still keep in touch.

Perhaps one day one of Joanne's own students will be knocking at her door or calling her up on the phone telling her how much they were inspired by her. I have no doubt that will happen, if it hasn't already.

Finding Yield in a Low-Rate Environment With Dividend-Paying Stocks

Finding Yield in a Low-Rate Environment With Dividend-Paying Stocks

For today's income-oriented investor, it's been a frustrating time. Yields on US Treasury bonds, as well as investment-grade municipal and corporate bonds have hovered near historical lows. Even longer-term issues remain in the doldrums; rates on 30-year Treasuries have not topped 4% since October 2008¹

But for investors seeking income, there is an alternative: dividend-paying stocks. There are now 395 companies in the S&P 500 that pay dividends, and the average yield on these stocks has been rising since 2000. As of December 31, 2012, the average yield of a dividend-paying stock in the S&P 500 was 2.4%, compared with 1.9% for 10-year US Treasuries.¹

But there's more to dividend-paying stocks than yield. The long-term benefits of dividends are significant:

• Dividends are a key driver of total return.

There are several factors that may contribute to the superior total return

of dividend-paying stocks over the long term. One of them is dividend reinvestment. The longer the period in which dividends are reinvested, the greater the spread between price return and dividend reinvested total return.

• Dividends help boost returns in down markets.

Since 1926, dividends have accounted for over a third of the returns of the S&P 500. In down years, when price return is negative, dividends help offset the drop. Since 1926, dividends have provided average return 4.5% in all 12-month periods where the index declined, which helped offset the average price decline of 18.6%.

• Dividend-paying stocks offer potentially stronger returns and lower volatility.

Dividend-paying stocks have outperformed the broader market over time. Stocks with a history of increasing their dividend each year have produced higher returns with lower risk than non-dividend-paying stocks. For instance, since 1990, the S&P 500 Dividend Aristocrats--those stocks within the S&P 500 that have increased their dividends each year for the past 25 years--produced annualized returns of 11.04% versus 8.23% for the S&P 500 overall, with less volatility, as measured by standard deviation (14.14% versus 15.22%, respectively).²

Dividends benefit from continued favorable tax treatment.

The extension of the Bush-era tax cuts helps to reinforce the current case for dividend stocks. The tax bill passed in late 2010 extended the 15% tax on qualifying dividends and other forms of

investment income through December 31, 2012. Because there are restrictions on the types of dividend income subject to the lower 15% rate, investors should consult a tax advisor to determine how tax laws apply to their situation.

• Dividends are a sign of corporate financial health.

Dividend payouts are often indicative of a company's financial health and management's confidence in future cash flow. They are usually paid by mature businesses, and communicate a positive message to investors who perceive a long-term dividend as a sign of corporate strength.

Keep in mind that like any stock, dividend-paying stocks can lose money, and there is no guarantee that dividends will be paid in the future. But for investors seeking current income or an income-producing alternative to diversify a portfolio, dividend-paying stocks can be an attractive choice. Our team, the SVS Team at Morgan Stanley,





Eagle Scout, something only 2% of boys who start out in Scouting will do. Three out of three is astounding.

She has worked with NJCAP, New Jersey Child Assault Prevention (NJ CAP) which is a statewide community based prevention program. According to their website, their motto "All Children Deserve to be Safe, Strong and Free" ®, the CAP program seeks to reduce children's vulnerability to abuse, neglect and bullying by providing comprehensive prevention workshops for children, parent and school staff. The project is sponsored by the NJ Department of Children and Families and supported by school districts across the State. NJ CAP is one of 35 CAP Regional Training Centers of the International Center for Assault Prevention.

Kim became involved with the Manalapan Board of Health in 1999 and held the position of chair 4 times. The members are charged with the responsibility of protecting the health of the residents. Working hand in hand with the Health Department, topics that are routinely addressed by the Board are food protection in the local food establishments, review of proposed development that are served with septic systems, water quality, communicable disease incidence and control, animal control, public health emergency and disaster planning including management of the Manalapan MRC-CERT and other traditional public health services.

Shortly after 9/11, Kim began a volunteer medical reserve corps after realizing the need for it. Being a RN, she had the medical background to approach the Surgeon General's office and get the MRC up and running. Shortly after, she worked through FEMA to begin a CERT program (Community Emergency Response Team) and arranged for their program to be granted \$50,000 per year for three years,

Nursing, according to my friend Wikipedia, "is a profession within the health care sector focused on the care of individuals, families, and communities so they may attain, maintain, or recover optimal health and quality of life." Kim Silverstein, Manalapan resident and Registered Nurse for 32 years, has taken this definition seriously and lives every day of her life to achieve it.

Kim grew up in Peabody, Massachusetts as you can tell from her accent. She discovered her love for New Jersey in 1976 when she attended Fairleigh Dickenson University. She has lived in Monmouth County with her husband Jay and three sons since 1985 and in Manalapan since 1993. It is our good fortune that she did.

Shortly after moving to Monmouth County, Kim and Jay jumped right in and got involved in the Boy Scouts of America. Kim became a Cub Scout leader in 1993 and stayed involved as leader until 2005. Her husband, Jay, became a Boy Scout leader when his own son 'crossed over' to becoming a Boy Scout. Kim and Jay's three sons, Corey, Sam and Brad, all stayed with the program and achieved the level of

toward equipment. The grant allowed for salaries to be paid, but Kim and her team waived that right and put the money toward improving the readiness for emergency for her neighbors. Thanks to her efforts, Manalapan now has a field hospital to help tend to injuries on sight. Kim now supervises 334 volunteer emergency

responders.

Kim's philosophy has always been "It's better to give than to receive. If everyone did one nice thing, the world would be a much better place for all of us." Following in the wake of Hurricane Sandy, Kim mobilized her volunteers to assist the battered Manalapan, leaving many residents without food, shelter, heat and electricity. With the help of Manalapan's Samaritan Center and good neighbors like Wegmans, Kim and her team mobilized two shelters and emergency hotlines to service the residents, ice dispensing stations as well as mobile cellphone charging stations so the residents can stay in touch with family and keep their perishables chilled. Somehow

she and her volunteers managed to feed 150 emergency workers and volunteers 3 meals a day for the 12 days it took to put crumbled Manalapan back together again.

Manalapan recently held their Mayor's Ball where the volunteers who served in 2011 were celebrated. Kim received a special award for her service to Manalapan and its residents.

You would think that with all of the above, Kim's dance card would be very full. She also works part time through St. Peter's Hospital providing skilled nursing to residents of Cranbury's adult communities.

So when I say it is our good fortune as a community to have Kim Silverstein among us (and my good fortune to know her personally), think of all of the nice things Kim has done as a volunteer to make our world a better place. She has taken her knowledge and energy and has become an inspiration to many. It is for this reason; I believe she deserves a hand shake and much appreciation.

Well-Water Testing Initiative

The Crosswicks-Doctors Creek Watershed Association (CDCWA) announces the continuation of a well-water testing initiative within the Crosswicks- Doctors Creek Watershed. This is an opportunity for local residents to learn about the safety of their well water. The initiative is being funded, in part, by a grant from The Watershed Institute. The test will determine the chemistry and characteristics of the water sample for the following parameters: total coliforms (e. coli), nitrates, hardness, pH (acidity/alkalinity), iron, lead and arsenic. All of these parameters are a subset of the much more rigorous New Jersey Private Well Testing Act (PWTA) analysis. This test is not a substitute for the PWTA test.

Through this initiative, the CDCWA is able to offer the test to residents of the watershed for \$95. The regular price of this test is \$225. All water samples will be analyzed by a certified New Jersey laboratory and all who participate in the program will receive a one-year membership to the CDCWA. All new members also receive a free CDCWA T-shirt.

This offer is time limited and is good for the first 43 respondents or until Oct. 31, whichever occurs first. Warm Weather Is Here: It's Time to Protect Against Ticks

From May through July, people get tick bites and tick borne diseases more often than any other time of year in the United States, but many may not know they are at risk.

Each year, nearly 30,000 confirmed cases of Lyme disease are reported to CDC, but a recent national survey reported that nearly 20 percent of people in areas where Lyme disease is common were unaware that it was a risk. Monmouth County is one of these areas where Lyme disease is more common.

And even in those areas where the disease is common, 42 percent of individuals reported taking no personal preventive measures against ticks.

Other key tick borne diseases include Rocky Mountain spotted fever, anaplasmosis, ehrlichiosis, and babesiosis. These diseases tend to be concentrated in specific parts of the country.

Nearly 95 percent of Lyme disease cases occur in 12 states (NJ is one of them).

Reducing exposure to ticks is the best defense against Lyme disease and other tick borne infections.

CDC recommends people:

- Avoid areas with high grass and leaf litter and walk in the center of trails when hiking.
- Use repellent that contains 20 percent or more DEET on exposed skin for protection that lasts several hours. Parents should apply repellent to children; the American Academy of Pediatrics recommends products with up to 30 percent DEET for kids.

Always follow product instructions.

- Use products that contain permethrin to treat clothing and gear, such as boots, pants, socks and tents or look for clothing pre-treated with permethrin.
- Treat dogs for ticks. Dogs are very susceptible to tick bites and to some tick borne diseases, and may also bring ticks into your home. Tick collars, sprays, shampoos, or monthly "top spot" medications help protect against ticks.
- Bathe or shower as soon as possible after coming indoors to wash off and more easily find crawling ticks before they bite you.
- Conduct a full-body tick check using a hand-held or full-length mirror to view all parts of your body upon returning from tick-infested areas. Parents should help children check thoroughly for ticks. Remove any ticks right away.

Tick borne diseases can cause mild symptoms to severe infections requiring hospitalization. The most common symptoms of tick-related illnesses can include fever/chills, aches and pains, and rash. Early recognition and treatment of the infection decreases the risk of serious complications, so see your doctor immediately if you have been bitten by a tick and experience any of these symptoms.



The Roads of Progress; Information from Monmouth County on our Roads

Do you drive down County Road 537 and wonder what is going on at the intersection of County Road 527? I drive by daily and have seen lots of progress but couldn't figure out what the objective is. I put in a call to Tom Arnone, Monmouth County Freeholder, who gladly introduced me to our County Engineer, Joe Etore.

The objective is an overall improvement at the intersection of CR527 (Smithburg Road/Siloam Road) and CR537 (Monmouth Road), effecting the townships of Freehold, Manalapan and Millstone. Many of us have noticed and been inconvenienced by the traffic backup at certain times of the day... your elected officials have heard you!

The proposed improvements entail the replacement of the existing traffic signals with new pole-mounted traffic signals. There will be widening of roadways to accommodate the construction of an additional through lane in each direction on CR 537 (total 5 lanes through the intersection) and an additional through lane northbound on CR 527 (total 4 lanes through the intersection.)

There will be construction of Full Depth Pavement, concrete curbs, driveway aprons, and drainage improvements; milling and overlaying of the roadway. Once completed, the plans include topsoiling, fertilizing, seeding, and mulching the disturbed soil area. There will also be the needed signing and striping; and any other incidental work.

Not to worry neighbors, the anticipated date of completion is June 30, 2013. If you have ever done home improvements or any kind of construction, you may understand that that date is a projection and isn't carved in stone. Hopefully the contract amount: \$2,283,344.21 project will be an on-time performance.

You may also have noticed resurfacing of County Road 571 (Millstone Road) in the Township of Millstone. The improvements entailed the milling, resurfacing and striping of 1.3 miles of CR 571 (Millstone Road). The limits of these improvements started at the intersection of CR 526 (Trenton-Lakewood Road) and extended to the intersection of CR 524 (Stagecoach Road).

This work has been completed and was done as part of the County's \$4.8 Million 2012 Resurfacing Program contract. The County annually awards a resurfacing program contract to mill and overlay approximately 15 centerline miles of County roads. This Resurfacing program has been instituted by the County in order to maintain the ride ability and structural integrity of our 380 mile County roadway network.

Proposed but not yet approved projects are as follows:

*Intersection Improvements at CR 524 (Stage Coach Road), CR 571 (Millstone Road), and Paint Island Springs Road, in the Township of Millstone:

The existing intersection is an unconventional configuration made up of 5 approaches. The County is evaluating alternatives to improve traffic flow through this intersection. A design contract is in progress and construction is anticipated in late 2014.

Consultant: Greenman-Pedersen, Inc. Contract Amount: \$158,750.00 Lebanon, New Jersey

*Bridge MS-48 Reconstruction and Replacement of the Perrineville Lake Dam in the Township of Millstone:

The existing timber bridge and dam spilling will be reconstructed in their entirety. The new structures will be designed to meet current NJDOT codes and NJDEP

hydraulic requirements. Estimated Construction Cost: \$3.5 Million

*Intersection Improvements at CR 537 (Monmouth Road) and Burnt Tavern Road in the Township of Millstone:


The existing intersection will be upgraded to improve sight distance and weaving movements from the nearby interchange at Interstate 195. Estimated Construction Cost: \$450,000.00

*Drainage Improvements at CR 527A (Woodville Road) near Baird Road (Wagner Farm Park) in the Townships of Millstone and Manalapan:

The existing roadway is higher than the adjacent property and is retaining storm water runoff on private property located on the west side of CR 527A. Drainage facilities will be installed to alleviate this chronic flooding along Woodville Road by conveying the storm water runoff across the roadway to a natural water course on the east side. Discussion - Durable Power of Attorney

Who Will Handle Your Parents Affairs If They Cannot

If you think you can just take over that job, sadly you are mistaken. So how can you protect loved ones,

who find themselves unable to manage their affairs due to aging, sickness or accident? If a person is married, no one but a spouse has authority to act on another person's behalf and there are limits to what a spouse can do as well.

When a client's father had a stroke, she found that she could not legally access his checking account, admit him to a nursing home or sell his home, among other things. Merely signing his name on checks or other documents is considered forgery and is illegal. Such actions could create many problems between family members as well.

Since her dad was already incapacitated, my client had to initiate a legal proceeding to become his court appointed guardian. Even though it was simple and uncontested, the proceeding was costly, time consuming and stressful. This simple proceeding took several months and cost thousands of dollars during which time she could not act on her father's behalf and his home and stock portfolio, which she could not access, lost considerable value.

This terrible situation can be easily avoided with common sense planning and foresight. The solution is to have your loved one execute a document known as a durable power of attorney before they become incapacitated.

Once a person becomes incapacitated it is too late for them to execute this extremely valuable and important document.

A durable power of attorney appoints an agent who is authorized to pay bills, cash checks, sell property, invest money and perform many other acts on behalf of the

person that has chosen that has signed the document. You don't need court approval to have one and it is not necessary to transfer title to assets, although, with this document you can legally do so, should it be needed.

There are different types of powers of attorney. A durable power of attorney is effective immediately upon proper execution and remains in force until the death of the person who signed it. This is recommended for individuals who feel they need help in managing their affairs due to aging or illness. A durable power of attorney is a powerful document that can prevent many potential complications and expenses by assuring that someone trusted by the person needing help is handling their finances and personal affairs in a way they require and prefer.

It is an easy and cost effective way to avoid a costly and time consuming court proceedings to be appointed guardian or conservator by the court. However, it must be done while a person is of sound mind. So please consider having your loved one execute this document before you think they may need it. Doing so will certainly make things less stressful when it is needed and will help preserve the assets of the person needing it for you and yours.

Dear Millstone Times Editor,

I am an active hiker and a resident of Upper Freehold Township in Monmouth County. The Union Transportation Trail which is part of a network of linear parks or "rails to trails" is a very popular concept that has been widely accepted throughout the country. The partially completed trail currently ends at Davis Station Road. Instead of the trail continuing forward on the permanent easement established in 1998 specifically for recreational trail use, it appears that the trail is being diverted to follow a route along Davis Station Road and along Route 539 where it will be within about 10 feet from the road.

There have been horrific accidents along the stretch of Route 539 where this trail is being diverted to. There is an extraordinary volume of truck traffic with the trucks traveling at high rates of speed along this stretch of roadway and the trail diversion seems to be a recipe for disaster. The recreational trail is used primarily by hikers, horseback riders and bicyclers. Has there been any consideration that families will not have the expectation to let their children wander a few feet in front of them in fulfillment of the rails to trails concept? Riders and their horses on the trail will definitely get "spooked" by the traffic traveling at speeds in excess of 50+mph. Current laws in sections of Upper Freehold Township state that

vehicular traffic must slow to 25 mph when horseback riders are present. Will that happen on this busy stretch of road with the presence of horses?

Why is the trail being diverted off the serene permanent right of way which was granted to the Monmouth County Park System more than a decade ago and relocated to an inevitably doomed location? I am fearful to think of not only the possible scenarios but of the probable scenarios when such an extreme and direct conflict between heavy truck traffic and recreational trail users will exist.







The Importance of Routine Eye Exams

Regular eye exams are an invaluable tool in maintaining your eyes' health by detecting and preventing disease. Some diseases develop slowly without causing pain or vision loss. Early detection of any problems can reduce the risk of further harm and allow for a choice of treatment options. Routine eye exams have many benefits:

Alert for Systemic Disease & Eye Conditions

Many health problems can be diagnosed through a

comprehensive eye exam. Early detection can help lessen some of the long-term effects and help preserve vision. Some of the systemic diseases, health conditions, and eye disorders that may be identified and diagnosed are:

- Diabetes
- Cataracts
- High blood pressure
- Glaucoma
- High cholesterol Macular degeneration Thyroid disease Retinal detachment

How often should you have an eye examination?

Children should have a screening of their vision by about age 3 and on a yearly basis thereafter. This can be done in our office, by the pediatrician or school nurse. After the initial childhood eye examination, routine examinations should be done in our office about every 2-3 years to make sure that sight is developing normally. For adults, a routine eye exam every 1-2 years is recommended, and at least once a year after age 50.

People with diabetes should have an eye examination every year starting when they are diagnosed with diabetes, no matter how old they are. And people who have relatives with eye diseases, such as glaucoma or macular degeneration, should have examinations as early as possible.

Monmouth County Board of Health - Mold **Guidelines for NJ Residents and Businesses**

As New Jersey continues to rebuild from Super-storm Sandy, the New Jersey Department of Health has partnered with state, local, and federal partners to develop a pamphlet to guide New Jersey homeowners on mold and mold remediation. Molds are found in virtually every environment and can be detected, indoors and outdoors, year round. Mold growth is encouraged by warm and humid conditions. Outdoors they can be found in shady, damp areas or places where leaves or other vegetation is decomposing. Indoors they can be found where humidity levels are high, such as basements or showers. Although molds are common in our environment, mold may become a problem when it grows inside homes. These guidelines were developed to better inform homeowners on how to ensure their homes are cleaned and remediated properly to avoid mold problems now and in the future. Molds can cause staining of walls and ceilings and can affect building components causing property damage. Exposure to mold can cause nasal and throat irritation, coughing or wheezing, eye irritation, or, in some cases, skin irritation.

The pamphlet addresses a number of topics including mold-related health concerns, how to inspect for mold and tools and techniques for clean-up.

The pamphlet also includes checklists on inspection services and mold remediation to help guide residents in steps they should take when addressing mold problems in their home.

The guidance also contains tips and questions to ask when hiring a consultant or remediation contractor that will help residents evaluate these professionals. It is important to know that the MOLD Assessment should be performed by a different company other than the Remediation company. It is considered a conflict of interest to do both testing and remediation in the same company. The assessment company should provide the scope of work, then the remediation company should then estimate for only the services recommended by the assessment company. 



Jean Klerman; Planting the Seed Which Became The Jewish Heritage Museum Of Monmouth County

Jean Klerman has been a resident of Monmouth County since 1967. Having been raised in New York City, attending The University of Michigan and later living in Maryland, Monmouth County became her home. Jean was an art history and history major in college. She had many years of experience as a librarian. She combined this with her strong feeling about the Jewish people and delved into intense research to chronicle their history in New Jersey.

Jean worked for the Monmouth County Library System for 25 years and retired in 2001. During her time there, she worked on a collaboration with The Jewish Bicentennial Committee which published "Peddler to Suburbanite: The History of the Jewish people in Monmouth County, New Jersey" in 1981. After her retirement, she put her efforts into updating the book, starting with the colonial period. In 2003 she made a presentation of her research to The Friends of Monmouth Battlefield entitled "Jewstown, Monmouth County 1778." This coincided with the 225th anniversary of the Battle of Monmouth.

Four years later, Cheryl Cook, member of the Freehold Township Historic Preservation Committee and fellow library retiree, approached Jean with information about the availability of the Levi Solomon Barn as a possible site for a Jewish Museum. For those long time residents of the area, you may remember a home and barn at the corner of Route 537 and Wemrock Road which was preserved and moved toward the back of the property to

allow for commercial development, now the Mount's Corner Shopping Center. When the property was before Freehold Township with a development plan, it was agreed with the developer, Bernard (Nardie) Hochberg, that the second story hayloft would remain open to the public as a historic venue.

In February 2006, the Jewish Heritage Museum of Monmouth County was incorporated as a New Jersey nonprofit corporation. After many years of planning and many, many hands involved in the development, Freehold Township now has this jewel of a building to house the museum and to fulfill their mission "To connect Jews to their heritage and to present exhibits, programs, and publications that celebrate, preserve, explore and illustrate the rich and unique history of the Jewish residents of Monmouth County."

Jean, a Fairhaven resident, says the museum is her greatest satisfaction after her two children and six grandchildren. It has combined her love and interest in history, art and organization. Jean is a Co-founder of the museum and it's first Director.

When I went to meet with Jean in early May, the exhibit was about the Jewish farming community in our area titled, "The Land Was Theirs." The exhibits change after a few months and encompass many interesting topics. I attended a few years ago when they exhibited information and artifacts from the Jewish people who fought in WWII. Being that the first documented Jewish resident, Isaac Emanuel, settled in Freehold in 1720, there are almost 300

years of history to work with. The events encompass history, music, theater, art and a host of other cultural events.

Although Jean herself has never farmed, she is a farmer of sorts. She, along with other volunteers, came up with a concept and planted a seed of an idea. Through the hard work and dedication of a team of volunteers, they nurtured this seed and watched it grow to fruition. Generations to come will benefit from the fruits of their labor.

and benefit from them, they would love to hear from you. Volunteers are always welcome and appreciated as are donations. Most importantly, check out their website to see what they have cooking http://www.jhmomc.org/ and visit the museum and see for yourself. You are stepping back in time to a building dating back to 1875 and getting a lesson on the history of Monmouth County and the Jewish people that helped it grow.

Roosevelt RAP Celebrates its 25th Anniversary

A Tiny town with a Whole lot of Talent

Following along route 571, one would pass through Roosevelt before realizing that they just passed through it. They might have noticed the bust on the far side of the Elementary school's lawn of President Franklin D. Roosevelt, to whom the town was named after, but they probably never realized the history or the talent that lies within its tiny border. A town with a rich and meaningful history that dates back to the Great Depression as a part of President Roosevelt's New Deal Act. The town grew around the idea of cooperative farming and manufacturing. The planning of the town was started by Benjamin Brown and Hyman Alef after purchasing land to build homes. It was furthered carried on by Rexford Tugwell, head of the New Deal Resettlement Corporation, who helped to shape the town and bring in the people from the city to work. People earned their living by farming and working in the garment factory that was built. The reasoning behind building the town was to help people in urban situations relocate in order to escape poverty. The project was called the Jersey Homesteads and there are many of the original onestory cinder block homes still existing today. The Jersey Homestead cooperative didn't last through World War Two due to internal fighting and political opposition. In 1983, it was added to the New Jersey Register of Historic places. What it did leave behind was a growing number of talented people who would shape Roosevelt into the Artsy little nook in the woods that it is today. One of the earliest artists in town was Ben Shahn, who was hired to paint a fresco mural in 1937 on the wall inside the Roosevelt Public School. During the painting of the mural, he decided to stay in Roosevelt. Shahn was a major artist in mid century America. His presence drew other artists into the area; most notably Jacob Landau, David Stone Martin and his son Stefan Martin, Gregorio Prestopino and his wife Elizabeth Dauber Prestopino. Over the decades, many more artists and musicians followed.

Ben Shahn's mural is made up of three panels that show the history of the Jersey Homestead, starting with the eastern European Origins of its Jewish Residents, their passage through Ellis Island, and the making of plans for the community of Roosevelt. With the celebration of the 25th Anniversary of the Roosevelt Arts Project, people were able to view the mural at the school over the past weekend.

The Roosevelt Arts Project (RAP) is a collaborative venture of Friends and neighbors in and around Roosevelt bringing together their art works, music, and other media to the public. It was founded in 1986 by nationally known Artists Bernarda Bryson Shahn and Jacob Landau, and also includes writers, musicians, playwrights, painters, potters, poets, folksingers, composers, and more. What better way to commemorate the 25th anniversary of RAP by holding an Anniversary weekend starting at the Public school underneath the Ben Shahn mural. The event showcased the works of over forty artists both past and present. It represented paintings, sculptures, pottery, and more. The weekend event hosted talks, poetry, videos, and music. Paul Prestopino, former member of Peter Paul

and Mary, David Brahinsky, Nancy Hamilton, and Ed Cedars performed folk songs for the crowd while David Herrstrom, Judith McNally and David Keller read their poetry. Bill Leech and Chris Martin also played the guitar. Children's artwork was displayed throughout the school hallways.

A video by Ben Johnson played in a nearby classroom talking about the architecture of Roosevelt. The original houses were designed by a German Immigrant named Alfred Kastner who designed a modern home for the times. Roosevelt pianist and composer, Alan Mallach, gave a public performance as he presented a piano recital featuring the music of prominent American composers of the New Deal Era. A light/ sound parade followed in the evening adjacent to the school. Though tiny in square miles, Roosevelt is mighty proud of the number of talented people who started out within its boundaries. The Roosevelt Art Project is a way to preserve the past, remembering the ones who paved the way, and to celebrate the present and newly emerging artists in the area. CERT-ify= Able

Over the years we have all come to realize that bad things happen to good people. Whether it is an act of God like a natural disaster or the act of a disastrous human, emergencies can happen at any time, anywhere. Often times, panic sets in and well-meaning people step up to take an active role in a remedy, many times without a clue of the best course of action. A game plan was needed but no one had it. The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) recognizes the importance of preparing citizens.

Most towns have emergency services in place. Police departments, fire departments and Emergency Medical Services (EMS) are very effective for the day to day life situations. On a larger scale such as a natural disaster as we have seen in the past, i.e. earthquakes, hurricanes, large scale fires and the threat of terrorist activities, the first responders are not be able to meet the demands, which have made it necessary to expand. People will have to rely on each other for help in order to meet their immediate lifesaving and life sustaining needs. Unfortunately, untrained people have lost their lives in a valiant attempt at rescues and may jeopardize others as well. If a community wants to enhance its response capability after a disaster, civilians can be recruited and trained as neighborhood, business and government teams that, in principle, will be auxiliary responders.

According to FEMA, "The Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) concept was developed and implemented by the Los Angeles City Fire Department (LAFD) in 1985. The Whittier Narrows earthquake in 1987 underscored the area-wide threat of a major disaster in California. Further, it confirmed the need for training civilians to meet their immediate needs." The CERT program expands the development of citizens understanding their responsibility in preparing for disaster, as well as increasing their skill to safely help themselves, their family and their neighbors. The Emergency Management Institute (EMI) and the National Fire Academy adopted and expanded the CERT materials believing them applicable to all hazards." CERT is about readiness, people helping people, rescuer safety, and doing the greatest good for the greatest number. CERT is a positive and realistic approach to emergency and disaster situations where citizens will initially be on their own and their actions can make a difference. Through training, citizens can manage utilities and put out small fires; prevent death by opening airways, controlling bleeding, and treating for shock; provide basic medical aid; search for and rescue victims safely, and organize themselves and spontaneous volunteers to be effective.'

The CERT course is delivered in the community by a team of first responders who have the requisite knowledge and skills to instruct the sessions. It is suggested that the instructors complete a CERT Train-the-Trainer (TTT) course conducted by their State Training Office for Emergency Management or the Emergency Management Institute in order to learn the training techniques that

are used successfully by the LAFD.

The CERT training for community groups is usually delivered in 2 1/2 hour sessions, one evening a week over a 7 week period. The training consists of the following:

- Session I, DISASTER PREPAREDNESS: Addresses hazards to which people are vulnerable in their community. Materials cover actions that participants and their families take before, during and after a disaster. As the session progresses, the instructor begins to explore an expanded response role for civilians in that they should begin to consider themselves disaster workers. Since they will want to help their family members and neighbors, this training can help them operate in a safe and appropriate manner. The CERT concept and organization are discussed as well as applicable laws governing volunteers in that jurisdiction.
- Session II, DISASTER FIRE SUPPRESSION: Briefly covers fire chemistry, hazardous materials, fire hazards and fire suppression strategies. However, the thrust of this session is the safe use of fire extinguishers, sizing up the situation, controlling utilities and extinguishing a small fire.
- Session III, DISASTER MEDICAL OPERATIONS PART I: Participants practice diagnosing and treating airway obstruction, bleeding, and shock by using simple triage and rapid treatment techniques.
- Session IV, DISASTER MEDICAL OPERATIONS, PART II: Covers evaluating patients by doing a head to toe assessment, establishing a medical treatment area, performing basic first aid and practicing in a safe and sanitary manner.
- Session V, LIGHT SEARCH AND RESCUE OPERATIONS: Participants learn about search and rescue planning, size-up, search techniques, rescue techniques and, most important, rescuer safety.
- Session VI, DISASTER PSYCHOLOGY AND TEAM ORGANIZATION: Covers signs and symptoms that might be experienced by the disaster victim and worker. It addresses CERT organization and management principles and the need for documentation.
- Session VII, COURSE REVIEW AND DISASTER SIMULATION: Participants review their answers from a take home examination. Finally, they

practice the skills that they have learned during the previous six sessions in disaster activity.

During each session participants are required to bring safety equipment (gloves, goggles, mask) and disaster supplies (bandages, flashlight, dressings) which will be used during the session. By doing this for each session, participants are building a disaster response kit of items that they will need during a disaster.

There is CERT training for adults as well as for teens. For information on some of the local teams:


